


make it easier for Liberty City residents to access the care they need and deserve.

Stay Safe in the Summer Heat

Sunshine and plenty of opportunities for outdoor fun. However, with rising temperatures comes a higher risk of heat-related health issues. Prolonged exposure to high temperatures can cause heat related illnesses and worsen existing medical conditions, making it crucial to take the right precautions. Here are some essential tips to help you stay healthy and safe this season.

Stay Hydrated – Drink plenty of water throughout the day to help your body stay cool and function properly. Proper hydration regulates your body temperature and lowers the risk of heat exhaustion and heat stroke.



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advises avoiding drinks high in caffeine, sugar, or alcohol, which can dehydrate you. To check your hydration, a simple method is to observe the color of your urine; if it is light yellow or clear, this signifies that you are well-hydrated.

Protect Yourself from the

Sun – Wear lightweight, longsleeved clothing and stay in the shade when possible. Apply broad-spectrum sunscreen with SPF 15+ every two hours, and wear UVA/UVB-blocking sunglasses for full protection.



Expanding Health Services to 60 Miami-Dade Public and Charter Schools

essie Trice Community Health System (JTCHS) is proud to expand its School Health Services to 60 Miami-Dade County Public and Charter Schools starting in the 2025–2026 school year. This five-year expansion will bring vital physical, mental, and behavioral health services to thousands of students and families.

In partnership with The Children's Trust (TCT), the Miami-Dade County Health Department (MDCHD), and Miami-Dade County Public Schools (MDCPS), JTCHS has steadily grown its impact since 2006. From an initial 12 schools to 40 by 2023, the year

our School Health Services Program received the coveted Program of the Year Award from TCT.

The JTCHS School Health Services program places a multidisciplinary team of nurse practitioners, registered nurses, and licensed clinical social workers in schools to deliver essential services. These include primary care, health screenings, mental and behavioral health support, nutrition counseling, first aid, chronic disease management, and immunizations. 
JTCHS is now an Age-Friendly Health System!
